Preliminary results in the studies section

ChessStar's annual studies tourney has quickly become the equal in prestige to that of any print magazine.

When asked to judge the 2022 edition, I felt honored and also excited to become

acquainted with the 34 studies published in ChessStar in 2022. ChessStar's earlier tourneys were still fresh in my mind. The 34 did not disappoint, as each study has something to offer.

After applying the usual rules for various criteria, such as soundness, originality, economy, etc., I produced the recommended ranking below. All the entries were good fighters, but some had weaknesses that led to them getting knocked out. The most common weakness was too many captures, particularly of immobile units. To fans of endgames, read on; some very pleasing studies await you!
