Yarmonov & Kirillov #4496 Anticipated by Kirillov, 3.p Badalov-55 MT 2017.


**Kandinski #4518** Two simple stalemates anticipated. The other two are dualistic. Technical deficits. All of this is not enough for an award.



After 3...Rg3+ ... 7...Rxe7 Black has a decisive tempo more than after 3.Kh2? Re3 ... 6...Rxe7. As they say when it comes to cars: "Price and performance are in the best ratio!"
